If we look after nature, will it look after us?




## Collaborative thinking

 Can you think of something in your life that does not, ultimately, come from nature?



## HomeTalk discussion suggestions



### For age 3 – 5 years



**Trees and wood:** there are about 50 times as many trees in the world as people. The oldest trees are thousands of years old. One yew tree in Wales is over 4,000 years old. Wood was one of the first materials used by humans.

## **Talking Points**

- How do we get the spoon from the tree?
- What other things made from wood can you find?
- How do trees help humans, apart from giving us wood to make things from?
- Would you like to plant a tree? Why, or why not?

## Activity

- Say, *I spy something that comes from wood* and see how long it takes other people to guess. The first one to guess gets the next turn.
- You could also say *something that comes from the earth, or the sea, or the sky,* or other natural things.

## **Talking Points**

- Does the chicken in the video look tasty enough to eat?
- How would you feel about eating meat that didn't come from an animal?
- What's good and what's bad about this meat?
- Is it really chicken if it didn't start life as an egg?

## Activity

- Find 5 different sorts of food or drink in your home or at school.
- Arrange them in a line from *most natural* to *most man-made*. See if your friends or family agree with the order you have put them in.
