

Urban Pioneers



These activities are for you to do at home with an adult. You can do all of them or choose the ones that you find most interesting.

Activities

1. With an adult, search online for striking urban buildings, such as The Shard in London or the Flatiron Building in New York. Print images and make a collection of amazing buildings in a scrapbook. Write some sentences about each building, explaining why you like it.
2. Use an Ordnance Survey map of your local area. Make a list of all of the different types of buildings on the map, using the key to help you. Identify any special structures and write a sentence or two to explain how they are used.
3. What makes a great city? Is it the parks and water features, the friendly people, or the clean, tidy streets? Decide what is important to you in a city. Use your ideas to design an imaginary city. Make a map to show how it is planned out and what features it has. Don't forget to include a key.
4. Imagine that you are about to entertain a visitor from another country. You want to impress them with your nearest town or city. Where would you take them for a day trip? Plan an itinerary to show them the best features of your local urban area.
5. The world has many amazing cities. Choose a city in another part of Europe to compare to your own nearest city. Record your findings in a table.
6. Graffiti is often found in urban areas. What is your opinion of it? Decide whether you think it is art or vandalism and write a paragraph to explain your thoughts.



7. Public art, such as statues, murals and sculptures, often tell us about the history of a place. Find out where these examples can be found and write a short paragraph about each piece to explain what it tells you about the history of the place where it is located.
